#### **Doctoral Research**

My doctoral research has assessed the impact of the imitation of pre-industrial Indian cotton textiles on the technological trajectory of mechanisation and industrialisation in the British cotton industry from the beginning of the 18<sup>th</sup> century till the second half of the 19<sup>th</sup> century. It has shown that imitations of Indian printed and painted cottons – the benchmark cotton goods of the period – steered the growth of the British cotton industry along a specific trajectory of mechanical innovations, guided by the quest to match the cloth and print quality of Indian cottons. Using a material evidence and digital, scientific experiments-based approach, I demonstrate that the introduction of Indian cottons into Western Europe stimulated and intensified the evolutionary process of technological change via material exchange, knowledge transfer and through the benchmark product itself, which contained the knowledge necessary for its replication, setting the course of mechanisation along a specific trajectory, and triggering modern economic growth through the first industrial revolution.
